November is upon us and with the recent snow and cold weather, it is not hard to believe. The fall activities are beginning,

pheasant hunting, fall dinners and simply putting things away and preparing for snow. All that is not remembering the important event of harvest, especially in the corn fields.

Perhaps the most important day of November is Thanksgiving, which is still of course some time away.

I sometimes wonder if it would be possible to start Thanksgiving now if it were not already in place. How much political posturing would there be before anyone could vote for setting up a new holiday? What excuses would be given for not saying thanks to God?

I think of those Pilgrims, with their surviving of the first winter in the new world, when more than half their number had been buried on a windy hill outside of town. Rations at one point had been cut to ten kernels of corn per meal. They had only small wild turkeys, lots of squash, fish and a few items that they had been taught to grow by the native American man Squanto for their first Thanksgiving. Squanto had had some contact with the Christian faith, after being captured and taken to Europe. This minimal contact helped him to care and share with persons he might have otherwise considered enemies. For many years there was a tradition in the New England States of placing on each Thanksgiving plate 10 kernels of corn as a reminder of how the pilgrims barely survived and what a contrast there is to our own table. For some people there was a tradition of naming 10 blessings of God that cannot be turned into cash before you eat your meal. Name them or eat the hard corn and no other goodies. To get you started, your family counts as one (no matter how large). Our national freedoms and all connected with them also count as one. You cannot say house, because it can be sold and turned into cash, likewise your car and any other material

possessions. Do we put too much emphasis on the material? Start counting or you may end up with only 10kernels of dry corn instead of turkey, pie and other goodies. By the way, don't count the meal, there are lots of people today who will go to a fancy restaurant and pay big bucks to have others prepare the meal. It too could be cash.

Is there a difference between the first Thanksgiving and ours? Of course, but we should still be thankful for the blessings that God richly heaps on us. What blessings do you have that others don't? Think about it.

GIVE, BUT NOT AS THE WORLD GIVES

This is the season of giving. No it is not Christmas yet, but it is the fall season when many of our churches in the Dakotas are having their fall stewardship drives. Some have actual pledges, some have faith promises, some have estimate of giving, some have harvest festivals – but typically during these fall months our churches and our people are making decisions about their giving. Included in these decisions is our Special Askings program, whereby local church choose which special mission projects they will support next year and turn in their pledges or estimates at their annual Charge Conference meetings. So, I urge you to give, but not as the world gives.

Jesus promised his disciples, "Peace I give to you, my peace I give you, but not as the world gives." What do those words mean?

- 1. Jesus gives us peace, not more turmoil.
- 2. Jesus gives us himself, it is personal.
- 3. Jesus doesn't give and then retract his giving -- it is eternal.
- 4. Jesus gives without regard for what we can do in return. Agape love, generous giving, grace.

What might this teach us about our giving?

- 1. Our giving, our stewardship should arise out of a sense of peace, justice, and rightness in the world. We don't give by some formula (even "tithing" is just a suggested Biblical minimum), we give out of our concern to make the world right. Is it right that children go hungry in our world? No, so let's give! Is it right that 29% of our children in the Dakotas live in poverty? No, so let's give! Is it just that so many people in our area still do not know Christ? Of course not, so let's give!
- 2. Our giving must be personal. Write a check, put your money in the offering, support your local church. But .. that is only a start. Our giving must also be personal, it must include visiting the lonely, praying for the sick, feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, and caring for the lost. Just sending a check doesn't get it done, giving is a personal endeavor.
- 3. Our giving must always be generous and never a tool for blackmail. I get really distressed by the few people who threaten to stop giving to their church or their denomination when they are upset about some issue. Is that the purpose for our giving? Do we give just to have "leverage" with others? No, our giving must always be generous, free, joyful in spirit.
- 4. Our giving can and should be without fear and without recourse. We don't give just to get our way, we don't even give just to receive God's blessings in more abundance (although that often happens). We give out of a sense of giving-away, setting our gifts free to do their work, and allowing God's Spirit the freedom needed to transform our gifts into little miracles. No strings attached, no conditions, no regrets. Just give.

Jesus teaches us to give, not like the world gives, but like Jesus gives. May our giving be blessed with the peace of Christ.

Old Business:


- --The annual fall beef dinner will be canceled for 2002. A Dinner Theater on December 7-8 is in the planning stages.
