"Ticking Crime Bomb" is a troubling article in the WEEKLY STANDARD by hard-nosed Princeton criminologist John J. Dilulio. While crime statistics have dipped recently, demographic and other forces are building for a big explosion in the near future. What to do? The best single answer, says Dilulio, is religion. "Why religion?" Two reasons. First, a growing body of scientific evidence from a variety of academic disciplines indicates that churches can help cure or curtail many severe socioeconomic ills. For example, a 1986 study by Harvard economist Richard Freeman found that among black urban youth, church attendance was a better predictor of who would escape drugs, crime and poverty than any other single variable (e.g., income, family structure) and that church going youth were more likely than otherwise comparable youth to behave in socially constructive ways. Likewise, a study by a panel of leading specialists just published by CRIMIINOLOGY concluded that, while much work remains to be done, there is sub-



crime and delinquency. And we







have long known that many of the most effective substance abuse prevention and treatment programs, both in society and behind bars, are either explicitly religious or quasireligious in their orientation. Secondly, religion is the one answer offered time and again by the justice system veterans, prisoners, and others. With particular reference to black youth crime, for example, it is an answer preffered in recent books by everyone from liberal Cornel West to neoconservative Glenn Loury, Democrat Jesse Jackson to Republican Alan Keyes.

Maybe there are more good reasons to get the kids and ourselves up and out of bed for worship and Sunday School than we thought. They learn the life and stories of Jesus and his love for them. It helps to make them, and us, better Christians, and in the process, also better more law abiding citizens.



World Communion Sunday

World Communion Sunday the 5th of 6 special giving Sundays will be October 5th. Purpose: "World Communion Sunday calls the Church to be the catholoic inclusive church."

World-wide Communion Sunday was established as a global interdenomination event by the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America.

Prompted by the impact of WWII, the Methodist Church received an offering on this Sunday for the Fellowship of Suffering. It aided the work of the Methodist Committee On Overseas Relief (now UMCOR), the Commission on Chaplains and the Commission on Camp Activities.

In 1971 the Methodist Church changed the name to World Communion Sunday and redistributed the offering to support the Crusade Scholarship Program, the Ethnic Minority Scholarship Program, and the Division of Chaplains and Related Ministries.

In 1980 Chaplains and Related Ministries was moved tyo the World Service funding, but the World Communion Sunday offering continues to assist racial and ethnic-minority persons pursuing various avenues of ministry.

Conde Administrative Council Minutes



Chairman Darrel Haskell presided at the September meeting of the Conde Administrative Board. Items discussed were the following:

<u>Furnace Replacement</u> This will be done sometime in October by Bullock Plumbing and Heating.

Roof Repair Grote Roofing gave an estimate for work that needs to be done. There are also problems with the new gutters leaking. ABC Siding will be contacted to determine what can be done to remedy this problem. Decision on roof repair was tabled until the next board meeting after more inquiry is done.

<u>Landscaping</u> on north side of <u>Church</u> There is a problem with the wood chips not staying contained within the edging that is now there. The plants that were put in by Park View Nursery about three years ago

are partially dead or not growing to the proper size. Darrel Haskell contacted the Nursery, and they will do some replacement at a cost because the year covered in the guarantee is expired. No decision was made on this matter.

Charge Conference There is no Central District Superintendent to preside at this meeting, so one of the Elders will be in charge. Rev. Eldon Reich from the First United Methodist Church in Aberdeen has been assigned to this duty. The date for this meeting is November 9, 2003 at 8:00 p.m. in Conde. In case of bad weather, the alternate date is November 12th.

<u>Church Reorganization</u> At a previous Church Board meeting, it was decided that the <u>Nurture/Outreach</u> /<u>Witness</u> structure that

was adopted about three years ago is not working out very well. The consensus of the Board was that we should go back to the old system where we had a Council on Ministries. This process will be taken care of by the Committee on Nominations. The previous organization will be used with the necessary adjustments being made by following rules stated in the Book on Discipline.
