Along with the expected political speeches and repeated rhetoric there will be at least some protesters. It all goes together. Nothing changes. Or has it? The protesters and their message are often hidden away from the center of the news. A generation ago, they were the news.

We've read about the civil rights marchers who were thrown into jail, we've seen video of demonstrators hauled off to dirty lock-ups in ominous daddy wagons. But modern protestors aren't as willing to take the risk of actually being inconvenienced. In Washington,

D.C., protestors at a meeting of the World Bank were outraged that vegan food was not available in jail. In New Mexico, Police Chief Beverly Lennen set up a system at the jail for reserving booking time in advance so

that activists protesting a visit by President George W. Bush could make bail in time to go home to bed.

Maybe some things have changed. But when you think about it all you wonder how committed these people are to their cause if they are not willing to be inconvenienced for the cause.

It all makes me think about our Christian Faith. How committed are we? Enough to stand up for it, but only if I can be home by bedtime? Our faith choices are not always popular with our society, with the people we live and work with or even sometimes our own family.

When you do or don't do something because it is a faith there is

sometimes a price to be paid.

Think it over. How committed are you in your Christian faith?





Heifer International

Country: Kenya



Summary: The Reru Parish region in western Kenya is characterized by low income, few opportunities and high rates of child malnutrition. Many of the youth who survive to their teenage years succumb to drug use. The Youth Group Dairy Cattle Program aims to provide a positive direction for this increasingly vulnerable population.

The program includes both boys and girls, who participate in the production of maize, beans and vegetables that are shared and also sold within the nearest village. In addition, 13 cows are being distributed, and the youth will receive training in their care and breeding.

Most of the farmers in the area have zebu cows, which are very low milk-producers. Heifer International will provide a breed of heifer that is high in milk production, increasing both nutritional and economic opportunities for the participants.

Each member of the group is expected to "pass-on" one female offspring at 12 months.



Mary Hayenga is Named to an Eight Persons Transition Team for Ministry Coordination Across UMC

Bishop Sharon Brown Christopher, a former president of the Council of Bishops has been designated to lead the team that will coordinate the process creating the Connectional Table to oversee coordination of mission, ministries, and resources across The United Methodist Church.

The church's legislative body, the General Conference, voted in May to create the Connectional Table to replace the General Council on Ministries.

The transition team is balanced between lay and clergy. It includes representation from the U.S. jurisdictional conferences and the overseas central conferences, and reflects the gender and ethnic makeup of the church. The council of Bishops, the current General Council on Ministries, and the Council of Finance and Administration appointed members. "We have a unique opportunity to shape the General Conference's vision for ministry in the 21st Century." Christopher said. "There is much to be done in a short time."

Members include Bishop Christopher of Springfield IL, Bishop John L Hopkins of Minneapolis MN, Leveeda Morgan Battle of Birmingham AL, Mary Hayenga of Andover SD, Rev. Marilynn M. Hunntington of Pasedena CA, Patrick Streiff of Nuechatel Switzerland, Gerald Williams of New York City, and Rev J. Phillip Wogaman of Washington DC.

The teams responsibilities include: Developing and implementing a plan to convene the Connectional Table. Provide for the orientation and training of the Connectional Table. Developing a process and designating persons to ensure the orderly reassignment of functions and responsibilities from the General Council on Ministries to the Connectional Table. Transferring corporate assets and liabilities to the trustees of the denomination. Developing a plan to care for personnel employed by the General Council on Ministries. And resolving all other essential matters of transition.

The legislation creating the Connectional Table requires the transfer of responsibilities from the General Council on Ministries to the new organization by Jan 1, 2005, with the General Council on Ministries dissolved on Dec 1. The work of the transition team may continue into 2005. Christopher said she believes most of the team's work will be completed soon after the first of the year.

Deborah L. Kiesey Named Bishop to Dakotas Conference

Bishop Kiesey has been appointed to serve the Dakotas Conference of the United Methodist Church for the next four years. She has been superintendent of the Waterloo District in Iowa since 2001.

Kiesey was ordained a deacon in 1975 and an elder in 1977 in the Iowa Annual Conference. She graduated from Morningside College in 1973 and received her Master of Divinity degree from Boston University School of Theology in 1976.

Kiesey places high value on colle-

gial leadership: "A leader needs to understand the importance of walking with others. When we work together, listen to one another, and truly allow ourselves to be touched by others' wisdom, we are all the stronger," she wrote in her nominee information. "There are times when a leader must be willing to make the difficult decisions - but only after thorough consultation and prayer.

Bishops are consecrated at the jurisdictional conference and are expected to report for work in their new areas Sept 1st.
