A Note From the Pastor

A young boy of 9 was sitting in his father's workshop, watching his dad work on a harness. "Someday Father," said Louis, "I want to be a harness-maker, just like you." "Why not start now?" said his father. He took a piece of leather and drew a design on it. "Now" he said, "take the holepunch and hammer out this design, but be careful that you don't hit your hand." Excited, they boy began to work, but when he hit the hole-punch, it flew out of his hand and pierced his eye! He lost his sight in that eye. Later, as it would turn out, sight in the other eye failed. Louis was now totally blind. A few years later, Louis was sitting in the family garden when a friend handed him a pinecone. As he ran his sensitive fingers over the cone, and idea came to him. He became enthusiastic and began to create an alphabet of raised dots on paper so that the blind could feel and interpret. Thus, Louis Braille in 1818 opened up a whole new world for the blind.

Not everyone can make something as good and beneficial as the Braille alphabet out of their problems or disasters, but perhaps when we do run into life's comparatively small problems perhaps we can do something positive with them or at least not let them defeat us even for the moment.

What is it that Jesus intends to do during his three years of ministry? What does he intend to do in the many years of our life? It is this: To open up a whole new world for you and for me. To bring us out of our poverty of ideas, commitment and soul that has long held us down and to recover site that you and I have long since lost.

At his home synagogue in Nazareth Jesus proclaimed his mission by quoting from Isaiah,

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor,

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and

Recovery of sight to the blind,

To let the oppressed go free and to Proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." Luke 4:18

Has it happened for you? Christ intends that it will.

subsistence farmers depend on sheep for income.



Items on the agenda January 14

The Trustees were authorized to proceed with two projects. The Robert Jenson memorial funds will be used to purchase and install new front doors for the church. Also under consideration is replacement of the kitchen counter tops.


