From Pastor Piehl




A Gift for Mom

Heifer Gets a Star

If you want to contribute to a charity that's among the nations best in commitment, fundraising efficiency and donor dependency, Forbes 2004 Investment Guide says you'll be hard-pressed to find a worthier one than Heifer International.

This annual special edition of Forbes magazine surveys 200 nonprofits and rates them on how efficiently they collect and distribute charity. But a new feature this year, a Gold-Star List of 10 charities Forbes considers worthy of your attention, put Heifer right at the top.

The survey calculates three key efficiency ratios, with higher numbers indicating "a better bang for the donor's buck." Charitable commitment indicates how much of total expenses went for the stated charitable purpose, excluding management, overhead, and fundraising. Fundraising efficiency measures the share of gifts after subtracting fundraising expenses. Donor dependency is the operating shortfall (outlays minus non-gift income) as a percentage of gifts. In all areas, Heifer surpassed the average numbers garnered by the 200 nonprofits sur-






meeting, and will contact the hostesses about furnishing a cake and trimmings.







2004 Tree of Life Roundup

August 6-8, Tree of Life Ministry, Mission, SD will be hosts to visitors from all 10 NCJ states plus Nebraska. Tree of Life will be featuring Native American guest presenters including Shere Wright, 2nd runner up to Miss Indian Nation, Webster Two Hawk, Episcopal Priest, Chief Duane Hollow Horn Bear, and drummers, singers and dancers. Featured guest presenters from the UMC will include Randy Day, General Secretary of the GBGM, Cynthia Kent the GBGM Executive Secretary for Native American and Indigenous Ministries, and Bishop Mike Coyner and Rev. Teri Johnson of the Dakotas Conference. Also attending is Jeanie Blankenbaker, GBGM Assistant General Secretary for Mission Volunteers.

Registration fee is \$105 per person. Housing & meals are included in the registration fee and include 2 nights lodging, 6 meals and snacks. Dormitory housing will be provided by the Tree of Life Ministry at their guesthouse and west wing. Both are air-conditioned. Bed linens and towels will be provided. There is no refund on unused meals or events. For the Saturday Drive-in day, the \$37 per person includes lunch and dinner.

You will have a chance to connect with tribal leaders, Lakota presenters, learn of Lakota spirituality and historical beliefs. Local drum groups and singers plus traditional, shawl, jiggle and fancy dancers offer participants a mini powwow experience.

Participants will tour the reservation by bus, seeing first-hand both the poverty and problems of life in one of the poorest counties in the U.S. More importantly they will meet Lakota people at work in care giving and ministries of hope at the day care centers, crisis center, museum, and churches. They will meet local artists and visit local shops.

"Dakotans need to register well before the deadline date in July because we will close registrations when we reach 80 people or so. In fact, register now," says VIM coordinator Lorna Jost.


