

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O beautiful for heroes proved

Newscaster Tom Brokaw went came to him, particularly vetto the beaches of Normandy in June 2004 to honor the thousands of soldiers who invaded France 60 years ago. Part of his report included an interview with a survivor of the invasion, an old veteran named Harold Baumgarten. He had been with 29 other soldiers who jumped from a landing craft to rush onto the beach while bullets peppered them incessantly. Only two of the group of 30 men survived the day. Baumgarten himself was wounded in his jaw and had to wait a day before he could be treated. Altogether on that one day some 4,900 soldiers died.

Harold Baumgarten was only 19, but such an experience made him a serious young man who, thanking God that he had survived, vowed to make his life count for something. He decided to become a physician and to dedicate himself to serve anyone who

erans.

Dr. Baumgarten kept his fees low so that those with smaller incomes would feel comfortable seeking his care. In his mind, he was serving on

behalf of his fellow soldiers who had died.


Thinking of the good Dr. Baumgarten has done in life, one wonders what positive contributions the many American men and women who died in the service could have made had they survived.

Katherine Lee Bates, who "America the Beautipenned ful" (1904), was surely thinking about such veterans when she wrote the third stanza:





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

Treasurer Sue Rock outlined the revenue and expenses for the period and reported a balance on hand of \$3,562.82. Motion made to pay a bill in the amount of \$6.75 for postage to return unsold SERVV merchandise was approved.

Fall Bazaar Evaluation: Despite a blizzardy day, total revenue from the Bazaar Bake, Craft, Country Store, and cash donations was \$798.36. Revenue last year was \$835.10. Katherine Collman presented a report on the SERRV Sale which was a new venture for the Bazaar this year. The total value of merchandise ordered was \$700.80 of which \$682.35 was sold. A check of \$618.85 was sent to SERRV. UMW received \$57 of the proceeds as a result of a 5% discount allowed on the merchandise ordered. She thanked those who assisted in setting up the displays. It was the consensus of the meeting that the UMW Fall Bazaar be held again next year in conjunction with the Men's Dinner and again include SERRV products.

Membership Incentive: The Executive Committee proposed that a draw-

ing of the names of each of those in attendance be done at each meeting. The winner will receive a membership pin. A motion to adopt the proposal was passed.

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Conde Ad Council - October 20th Minutes

Chairman Darrel Haskell called the October meeting to order and read the Mission Statement.

TRUSTEE'S REPORT: <u>Deposit Box</u>—There are no boxes at the bank that are large enough for the church record books. <u>Doors</u>—Some of the doors are not closing properly. <u>Handrails in bathroom</u>—The Women's bathroom is large enough for a wheel chair, but there needs to be rails installed by the stool. <u>Chairperson for board of Trustees</u>—In 2005, Norman Smith, who is currently chairman, will be off this board because of the three year rotation. Rev Piehl nominated Darrel Haskell. Council approved this nomination.

UMW REPORT: The General Meeting was held in the afternoon. The Unit has tentatively made plans for a Soup Supper in February. UMW Sunday will be on February 6 or 20th. Vice President Betty Taylor will have a 2005 Program Planning meeting on Thursday, October 28. The UMW will pay 37 1/2% of the Early Bird Camp fee for young people in the community who want to attend a 2005 United Methodist Camp. The youth are limited to one camp per year.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE: The Sunday School is doing well. Marsha Murphy and Ann Menzia are the teachers, and there are two age groups. They are sponsoring an aluminum can collection, and proceeds from this will go to the Heifer Project. The tabs should still be removed and saved for the Ronald McDonald House.

MISSION COMMITTEE REPORT: United Methodist Student offering will be taken on November 28th. During November and December, there will be a promotion to bring items or donate money for the UMCORE Layette Kits. The Conde and Groton committees are going to correlate the months for certain kits, so both churches will be collecting the same items.

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM FINANCE COMMITTEE MEETING: <u>Camp Fees</u>—There is a possibility of more youth wanting to go to camp and camp fees are increasing each year. With funds being somewhat short, the committee felt the amount budgeted for this should be decreased a small amount. In the past, the church has paid 50% & UMW 50% of Early Bird fees. The recommendation is to pay 37 1/2%. <u>Janitor Salary</u>—Cindy Smith, church janitor, has been receiving \$6.50/hour. It is recommended that her wages be increased to \$8.00/hour. At 9/30/04, only \$198.50 has been paid to her. <u>2005 Budget</u>—The proposed budget was presented to the Council for inspection, discussion, and approval. An error was found in the Parish Parsonage Fund entry. It was included in the budget twice, and the Finance Committee had not added this \$300 amount into the budget at all. Discussion had been that there was enough money in this account, so that neither church would have to give to this fund for the time being. This will have to be determined by common agreement of the Parish. The total budget amount is \$40,939. The council approved the budget.

NEW BUSINESS: <u>Change in Sunday Service time</u>—Groton has requested the 9:00 time on November 7, so it will be more convenient for their annual Fall Dinner. Conde will take the 11:00 service. <u>Church Building for Senior Citizens</u>—Because of election, the Senior Citizens cannot meet at the community center. Betty Jensen requested use of the church building. Approved by Council. <u>Charge Conference</u>—The date has now been changed to Wednesday, November 10th, 7:30 pm at Groton. <u>Thermostats</u>—It was decided to purchase two thermostats that can be set lower than what we have. A setting of 45 degrees should be available. There is concern of the high cost of heating the church, and

conservation of heat needs to be planned. There was also discussion of having Sunday Morning Church Services in the Fellowship Hall if the weather reaches frigid temperatures. <u>Youth Confirmation</u>–Rev Piehl announced that there would be classes in Groton for 7th & 8th grade youth. Shane Bruckner has consented to attend there. Pat Siefken is going to contact other youth in the community who may be interested in confirmation classes. If there are enough in this area, class time may have to be divided between the two churches. There may be some in Conde who are older than the 7th/89th grade level who missed the last confirmation class.

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Conference Apportionments

During the past year our church has become behind on our Conference Apportionments. That is an amount that we give to the conference for the work of the church beyond the local church.

Apportionments do a lot of good things like:

- Providing camping and Christian growth programs for all ages.
-) Supporting the World Service Fund, that strengthens our evangelism efforts, strengthens church growth, expands Bible studies and enriches spiritual commitment
- J Helps provide campus ministries in North & South Dakota Universities and Dakota Wesleyan University.
-) Provides pensions, healthcare and other benefits programs for active and retired clergy of the Dakotas Conference
-) Provides the publication of the Dakotas Connection, Living Waters, the conference websites and other communication links
-) Provides leadership and resources for pastors and laity. Provides resources through the Area Resource Library.
-) Enables United Methodists to have an effective presence in the activities of ecumenical organizations.
-) Enables our churches to unify and expand financial support for the recruitment and education of future pastors and bishops.
- Provides funding for the cost of pastors moving to a new appointment
-) Provides for salaries and expenses of Conference Superintendents.
-) Supports administrative work on the conference and general church levels.
-) Provides funding for pastor's salary support where needed to assist the ministers of the churches in our conference.

There is of course lots more that our apportionments are doing.. Since we are behind in this vital ministry of the church some of the ministries go unfinished.

We need large gifts to get us where we need to be, that is apportionments paid.

Therefore at the last Groton Ad Council Rev. Piehl offered this challenge, "If we can find 10 people who will give \$500 or more each, I will be number 11." As of November 1, Three persons have given have given \$500. We are 30% of the way there! There are many more people who are capable of an equal size gift toward the work of the church.
