In late 2003, a commission convened by Dartmouth Medical School, among others, concluded that young people who are religious are better off in significant ways than their secular peers.

They are less likely than nonbelievers to smoke and drink, and they are more likely to eat well.

They are less likely to commit crimes, and more likely to wear seat belts.

They are less likely to be depressed, and more likely to be satisfied with their families and schools.


"Religion has a unique effect on adolescents above and beyond factors like race, parental education and family income," said Brad Wilcox, a University of Virginia sociologist, to the Washington Post. Poor children who are religious will do better than poor children who are not, and in some cases they will do better than nonreligious middle-class children.

Sunday School watched a movie called "The Promise" to learn about the Heifer Project. Each child then received a calendar and bank to collect money each day as they do the activities on the calendar. They are working towards \$120 to buy a goat for their Heifer Project. Here the children are checking out a baby goat that was brought to church by Janell Little (Townsend) from Vienna, SD.



Goat's milk is the only milk known to half the world's people, but 80 percent of mothers and children in rural areas do not have any type of milk or milk products. The gift of a dairy goat is a lasting, meaningful way to help a struggling family on the other side of the world.

Goats can thrive in extreme climates and on poor, dry land by eating grass and leaves. Your gift of a dairy goat can supply a family with up to several quarts of nutritious milk a day — a ton of milk a year. Extra milk can be sold or used to make cheese, butter or yogurt. Families use goat manure to fertilize gardens. And because goats often have two or three kids a year, Heifer partners can start small dairies that pay for food, health care and education.

Until Francia and her young grandson, Jose, received a goat from Heifer, hunger and poverty were all they had ever known in the Dominican Republic.




But with their animal, they found hope. The goat gave them plenty of milk and produced kids to sell for income.

One morning, as the goat started her third birthing, Jose noticed the goat having trouble. The young boy knew he had to help the nanny. If she died, his family would be set back dramatically.

Jose's training had taught him how a kid should be positioned in the womb. Using plastic bags as gloves, Jose carefully put his hands inside the nanny's womb and discovered one of the kid's legs was in the wrong position.

A few minutes after Jose moved the leg, the goat gave birth to healthy twins. When news of Jose's story spread, people came from throughout the village to see the young hero and his goats.


History of World Communion Sunday

Originally a Presby-

terian observance, the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America established World-wide Communion Sunday in 1940 as a global, interdenominational event. Prompted by the impact of World War II, the Methodist Church received an offering on this Sunday for the Fellowship of Suffering and Service. It aided the work of the Methodist Committee on Overseas Relief (now UMCOR), the Commission on Chaplains and the Commission on Camp Activities.

In 1971 The United Methodist Church changed the name of the observance to World Communion Sunday and redistributed the offering to support the Crusade Scholarship Program (begun in 1944), the Ethnic Minority Scholarship Program and the Division of Chaplains and Related Ministries.

In 1980 Chaplains and Related Ministries was moved to World Service funding, but the World Communion Sunday offering continued to assist racial- and ethnic-minority persons pursuing various avenues of ministry.
