Under the category of little known and in our modern society little used facts, even if they are interesting comes this story.

In ancient Israel, where wood was relatively scarce, they used camel and donkey dung as fuel for their fires.

Every young girl learned how to gather the dung, form it into patties, day them in the sun, then store them for fuel as needed.

Pioneer women in the United States engaged in the same practice. It was the alternative fuel of the early plains.

Dried dung patties burn better when they are salted and placed on a block of salt in an earth oven...

Eventually, the salt loses its ability to make the dung burn. The salt is no longer good for anything and is just discarded. All this information is needed to construct the proper reading scenario for the "salt" passages in the New Testament....

"Salt is good. But if salt has lost its ability to start and maintain fires, how can that ability be restored? This salt is fit neither for the over, nor for preparing the fuel (the dung heap). People just throw it away" (Luke 14:34-35).

Salt and its many uses and value is also the origin of the expression "He's worth his salt" Or "earning his salt." The ancients knew that salt was an essential element in maintaining health, and its various uses as a food preservative, as a seal for wooden shipping containers, made it an extremely valuable commodity. Today, the salt industry says that the common mineral has about 14,000 different uses, making it the "Swiss army knife" of the mineral world.

With that many uses, each of us who are "the salt of the earth" (Matt5:13). Are likely to be given a different job in life by our Lord. If we each do our similar, but different job. The world will be a better place.



Ingathering for World Hunger

Saturday, September 18, at the Christen Wellness Center, Dakota Wesleyan University, Mitchell, SD. 8:30 am will be special music by pianist Tyler Andrews from Fargo, ND. 9:00 am will be worship with featured speaker Cathy Brechtelsbauer, the SD coordinator of Bread for the World. 10:30 am is the auction of handmade quilts plus other creations in wood, glass, and

fabric. A silent auction will be held throughout the day for many beautiful items. Coffee, pie, and ice-cream will be served throughout the day. Rolls, coffee, and lunch will be served by the Mitchell United Methodist Youth.

Sponsored by the Dakotas conference of the United Methodist Church, the Annual Ingathering for World hunger has generated annual cash gifts for agencies like the Banquet (Sioux Falls), Cornerstone (Rapid City), Salvation Army (Aberdeen & Huron), The banquet (Pierre), and the Tree of Life (Mission) as well as other hunger agencies in North and South Dakota. Fifty percent of the Ingathering receipts go to world hunger projects, 25 percent to international Heifer Project, and 25 percent to local hunger agencies. Last year's ingathering raised \$208,754.

In addition to quilts and pillows, craftsmen and women will be bringing carvings, wooden toys, stained glass, and other creations, organizers said. Personal checks as well as Visa and MasterCard are accepted. Hundreds of items are offered in a silent auction that continues throughout the day.

While auction-goers bid for quilts and crafts, volunteers are packing thousands of dollars worth of donated relief supplies. All year local United Methodist church groups assemble kits containing school supplies, sewing materials, hygiene supplies, or baby Volunteers will load layettes. more than 7,000 kits worth about \$100,000 for shipment to the UMCOR Depot. There the relief supplies are loaded in shipping containers bound for disaster and poverty areas both in the United States and around the world. Then, in cooperation with relief efforts of local governments and US relief agencies, the donated supplies are distributed in areas suffering natural disasters.

Groton Ad Council Minutes - August 11th Agenda

Gloria Pharis reported that 30 children are enrolled in Sunday School. Rally Day is Sept 12th. The children will bring materials for school kits the first day. Plans are being made to have an adult class on Sunday mornings at 9:45 am.

Membership records on the church computer have been completed and updated.

Carna Atherton-Pray stated that the Music & Worship Committee is planning changes to be made to the order of service for the Sunday bulletin. They are also working on changes in the music portions of the worship hour. Planning for Advent will start soon, and new decorations are being considered.

Tyke Nyberg reported that the Trustees did the annual parsonage inspection in June. Minor repairs to be done include two broken window closures which have been ordered, and all the trim needs to be painted. An electrician examined the church kitchen stovetop burners and found them to be in satisfactory working order. The repair of the cement sidewalk on the east side of the building has been done. The committee is awaiting an estimate on changing the church roof, rather than repairing the present roof at an estimated cost of \$5,000.

Finance Committee Chairman Allen Walter noted that monthly operating expenses have exceeded the monthly offerings, leaving Conference Apportionments (\$2,064.17/month) unpaid for three months. A plan of action will be finalized at the September meeting.

Joellen Townsend reported that the Missions Committee has set their plans for the final quarter. Work on the Ingathering is ongoing. Additional school bags need to be made.

Rev. Piehl announced that Bishop Coyner has been reassigned to an Indiana location. Bishop Deborah Leider Kiesey has been appointed as his replacement. She will be based in Fargo. There will be a reception


Patriot Day

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Dakotas Conference Builders Club Board of Lay Ministries

Join the Builders Club! The builders club is continually adding to it's membership list. If the Calls were served by 1000 members, the churches in need could be receiving up towards or over \$10,000 per Call!!

The Mission of the Dakotas Conference Builders Club is: To seek to offer helping hands to sister churches who are building or renovating churches and parsonages, or who need help due to natural disasters or emergencies. We trust that members of the Dakotas Conference will continue to give faithful support to churches in need well into the future.

At the time of the merger of North & South Dakota Conferences, a decision was made by the Board of Lay Ministries to ask members to consider supporting up to four calls per year by contributing at least \$10 to each call. Members are free to choose which of the calls they wish to support, but answering all the calls is strongly urged.

The Board has adopted a list of priorities when handling requests for help from the Builders Club. They are as follows: 1) emergencies and natural disasters 2) building new churches 3) church building renovations and 4) purchase or renovation of parsonages.

As the request forms come in, they are dated and placed on file according to the priority order. According to the total number of forms submitted and their priority, some may be set back/put on hold. In the event of extreme emergencies, a special call may be made.

Welcome Celebration for Bishop Deborah L. Kiesey

Bishop Deborah Lieder Kiesey has been appointed to serve the Dakotas Conference of the United Methodist Church for the next four years.

Kiesey has been superintendent of the Waterloo District in Iowa since 2001. She was elected bishop by delegates to the North Central Jurisdictional Conference meeting here July 15th.

Bishop Michael J. Coyner, who has served the last eight years in the Dakotas, has been assigned to his home state of Indiana. Kiesey was ordained a deacon in 1975 and an elder in 1977 in the Iowa Annual Conference. She graduated from Morningside College in 1973 and received her Master of Divinity degree from Boston University School of Theology in 1976.

Kiesey places high value on collegial leadership: "A leader needs to understand the importance of walking with others. When we work together, listen to one another, and truly allow ourselves to be touched by others' wisdom, we are all the stronger," she wrote in her nominee information. "There are times when a leader must be willing to make the difficult decisions—but only after thorough consultation and prayer."

Kiesey also referenced Methodist founder John Wesley, saying: "His dedication to evangelical and social action, his separation of theological fundamentals from theological opinions, his belief in a heart-centered and mind-centered faith will guide us well into the future. The church based on those principles will be a more diverse, a more spiritual and more inclusive church."

Election details and an introduction to the new bishop will be featured in the September edition of "Dakotas Connection." If you are not on the mailing list for this fourtimes-annually publication, please contact the Dakotas Conference Office.

Bishops are charged by the United Methodist "Book of Discipline" to "lead the church in its mission of witness and service in the world." The Book of Discipline is the rule of law for the church. Bishops reported to work in their new areas on September 1st.

A United Methodist bishop serves as a general superintendent of the entire church. Bishops also have the responsibility to see that the rules and regulations developed by General Conference are carried Bishops are responsible for out. setting all clergy appointments in the annual (regional) conferences they serve. Most bishops also serve on a general agency board, often as the president. The bishop is the presiding officer at the annual conference session and they rule on points of law.
