"I'm going to fine everybody in this court room 50cents for living in a town where a man has to steal bread in order to eat. Mr. Bailiff, collect the fines and give them to the defendant!"

The hat was passed, and a shocked old man left the courtroom with a stake of \$47.50

We begin Lent this month, February 9 is Ash Wednesday. Perhaps this short antidote can help us to understand a little better. God is our Judge. Whatever our excuse we have done wrong, sinned. But Christ pays the penalty for us by his act of love on Calvary and we not only go free, but God blesses us as we go to live our lives and sin no more...




Member Update

Those "drugs" still run through my veins and they affect my behavior — everything I do, say and think.




Conde UMW Minutes



Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, comes on February 9, 2005. We Christians observe Lent for 40 days (excluding Sundays) to examine our spiritual condition and to strive to improve our relationship with God.

Lent is also a period of spiritual preparation for Easter Sunday, the greatest day on the Christian calendar.

During Lent most churches have additional services. Some offer special Bible study events or classes in strengthening the spiritual life. It is a good time to study the life of a great Christian from the past and the ways that person developed closeness to God.

It's important that each Christian practice spiritual disciplines to "show that you are a letter of Christ ... written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets of human hearts" (2 Corinthians 3:3, NRSV).
