

The "I'm So Busy" Epidemic

In theory most of us believe that life is all about love, but in practice, expressing love to our families and others close to us gets crowded out of our schedules. Responsibilities and activities steal time away from those who matter most.

A frustrated mom told me, "I want to spend more time with my kids, but how do I get it all done?" I answered, "You can't! None of us can 'get it all done.' You have to make tough choices." Almost everything else in your life will conspire against you when you're making these decisions. The key is to keep reminding yourself of the following three truths about love.

The Best Use of Life is Love

Love is not just a *good* part of your life; it's the *most important* part. God tells us, "Let love be your greatest aim." We talk about finding time for our children. But our time with our children is so precious and finite, we must make them our greatest priority. Relationships, not achievements, are what matter most in god's eyes. Life minus love equals zero. In fact, the No. 1 destroyer of relationships is busyness.

The Best Expression

<u>of Love is Time</u>

In today's economy, many mothers feel they must work outside the home, and I have many friends who do an amazing balancing act between family and work. But it's hard. There *are* ways to give kids the focused attention they crave, though.

If you work outside the home, take a day off to go on that school field trip with your child. Yes, it's tough to miss a workday if there's an important meeting or deadline--but find a way to do it. Your kids will feel special because Mom chose to come.

All mothers can do "just me and mom" days once - even twice - a month. And that doesn't mean just having your child in tow for errands, but making a conscious effort to choose an activity that's special.

Try a once-a-week family "fun night." For more than 25 years, every Monday night has been



fin night for our family. We take turns choosing what we'll do, like going to a bookstore together after dinner. It's a great weekly reconnection.

The Best Time to Love is Now

"Our love should not be just words and talk; it must be true love, which shows itself in action," God tells us. Don't just say you want to spend more quality time with your grandmother or your sister. Do it. Don't let the whisper of love be drowned out by the deafening drumbeat of responsibilities. Put your relationships high up on your "to do" list.

Why is now the best time to express love? Because you don't know how long you'll have the chance. Circumstances change. People die. Children grow up. The best use of life is love. The best expression of love is time. The best time to love is now.



One church on September 11, 2001



Dr. Jon Walton, pastor of New York City's First Presbyterian Church, wrote a brief account about September 11, 2001, and the effect that day's events had

on his church.

He recalled that the church had to be left open for the people who continually streamed in. Some came to escape the smoke that affected their lungs and their eyes. Some came hoping to find friends or relatives. Most came to pray, to seek solace and to try to sort out why the unspeakable death and destruction had happened.

Dr. Walton soon learned that the tragedy directly affected several families related to the church. The husband of the church secretary, a nephew of the receptionist, a church-school teacher, the father of a child in the nursery and a young mother of two children were all missing or known to be dead.


Dr. Walton said he now understands the opening words of the book of Lamentations, which refer to Jerusalem when the Babylonians invaded and destroyed the city: "How lonely sits the city that once was full of people! How like a widow she has become, she that was great among the nations!" (Lamentations 1:1, NRSV).


