Here we are at one of the most personal times in our parish history. The taking of prayer partners and the potential to come from those who chose to engage in prayer.

John Maxwell, noted Christian author, has given us some beginning groundwork and suggestions for your Prayer Time.

First, **Preparation Time**. Find a comfortable spot, have your Bible, paper/pencil ready to use.

Second, Waiting Time. Isaiah 40: 31 "those who wait for the Lord, will gain new strength,"

Let God love you

God is waiting to tell you of God's love. Mentally allow yourself to "sit on Jesus' lap or cry on Jesus' shoulder" and let his unconditional love touch your heart.

Let God search you

When you let that happen, you will develop a relationship with God.


Let God show you


Give the day ahead to God. God can show you God's heart and how to minister to others in God's name just by placing names into your thoughts.

None of these three things come easy. They have to be worked on a little each day, but the rewards are wonderful.

Third: **Confess** our sins immediately. Remember, God has heard it all before and you cannot shock God, so be honest.

Fourth: Spend time in the Bible for each day. Read a little a day and it will prepare you for your day. Even one verse will make an impression on you and keep you going all day long. Pray that verse for yourself and then for others - it can be transforming.





Fifth: take some **Meditation Time**. Think about what God's Word means and the truth you found there. God will lead you once you begin to think about His Word and apply it to your life.

Sixth: **Intercession Time**. Praying for others. Here is where your pencil and paper come in handy. Write requests of names and situations to connect with God. Pray for God's will to be done.

Seven: **Petition Time**. Bring to God all your physical, emotional and spiritual needs. Pray "Thy will be done" Be honest. Talk about the little things that bother you.


Eight: Application Time. John 14: 23-24 "If anyone loves me, he will obey my teaching..." God will ask something of you in prayer time. Have your paper ready to take what God gives you to do. It might be one thing or two, usually not three.

Nine: **Faith Time**. Knowing that we don't have to know what God will do about a situation, but having FAITH that God will do something. Having the right motives helps us to know God will take care of God's business.

Ten: **Praise/ Thanksgiving Time**. Tell God you know who God is and what God has done. When we thank God, God inhabits us and blesses us.

Prayer is the "glue" that holds us together and keeps us accountable to God. These have been suggestions for your private prayer time. In using our new **prayer partners**, follow the small sheets you have been given or are available.

Call them once a week. Ask how they are doing in their lives. Ask how you can pray for


Instant giving

Groton Tuesday Morning Bible Study



Each week at 11:00 our study is followed by Prayer Group led by Pastor Jan. We spend 20 minutes lifting up others in prayer. Please Join us at any time!



Ann Cameron has adapted his narrative by shortening the text and updating the language. The cadence of the times is retained, and the book remains a riveting portrait of the horrors of slavery.

Blueberry Snack Bars

1 Box Yellow Cake Mix

1/2 Cup melted Butter or Margarine

3 eggs

1 8 ounce package of cream cheese

2 1/2 cups powdered sugar

1 21oz can Blueberry Fruit Filling

3/4 cup flaked coconut

3/4 cup chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. In large bowl combine cake mix, butter or margarine and 1 egg; blend well. Pat mixture into bottom of well-greased 15X10 inch jelly roll pan.

In a mixing bowl beat cream cheese until fluffy, beat in 2 eggs and powdered sugar. Pour over cake mixture in pan. Layer Blueberry fruit filling, coconut, and nuts. Bake 45 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool and cut into bars.
