






As we begin a new calendar year, let us always remember who we should follow in this world.

Three Kings Day

January 6 marks the day of Epiphany, the arrival of the three kings or wise men. The three kings were the Gentiles who "came from afar" to offer gifts to the Christ child. The meaning of the event is that Jesus came as Lord not only for Jews, but for Gentiles as well. Christ is the Savior of the world — the whole world.

Three Kings Day — or Dia de los Reyes in Spanish — is celebrated in many places around the world on January 6. Last year in Phoenix alone, more than 25,000 Latinos and others celebrated Three Kings Day. During the festivities, there are parades with camels bearing the "kings," toys are given to children, food is shared and folk dancers perform. Many women bake bread with a miniature plastic Jesus inside each loaf. The person who ends up with the figurine is obliged to host a party for others on

Served at the Tuesday Morning Bible Study for our Christmas Lunch. It was doubled.


- 3 cups potatoes, peeled and cubed
- 2 cups milk
- 2 cups frozen vegetables,
 - California Blend d American cheese. Vel
- 1 pound American cheese, Velveeta
- 3 tablespoons margarine salt pepper

Place potatoes in large saucepan with 4 cups water; bring to a boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 10 to 15 minutes or until tender; drain. Add milk and vegetables to drained potatoes; bring to a gentle boil over medium heat; reduce heat. Add cheese, butter and season to taste. Heat over low heat, stirring frequently, until cheese is melted and vegetables are tender-crisp. Serve

Human Relations Sunday - January 22nd

"Twenty-five years ago this was a really depressed area with a lot of gang violence. People were moving out of the community," recalls Deborah Bell, director of community development for Black Community Developers Inc. at Theressa Hoover United Methodist Church, Little Rock, Ark. "My father-the Rev. William Robinson Jr.—has a passion for people who are underserved. When he was appointed to this church in 1981, the first thing he did was to meet with people in the community to find out where the needs were."

"He had a vision," adds Paw Paw's Day Care director Karen Robinson-also Rev. Robinson's daughter, "He not only wanted a day care; he wanted everything else! And a lot of his vision came true."


Over the years, the start-up budget of \$5,000 grew to \$1.5 million. And the idea that sparked United Methodism's Community Developers Program continues to evolve. Today 12 ministries provide day care, after-school activities, gang intervention, jobs training, substance-abuse treatment, affordable/supportive housing and more.

Rev. Robinson is quick to note, "This is not my ministry. This is our ministry. And everyone has a part in it. Through the Human Relations Day offering, The United Methodist Church has been very helpful to us, and we reciprocate by doing everything we can to share out blessings."

The congregation pays its World Service and conference benevolences 100 percent.

"I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made," the Psalmist wrote. "Wonderful are your works; that I know very well." Through "rebuilding lives and restoring communities," Theressa Hoover Methodist Church United tells neighbors: You are God's creation, and you have great potential.
