Maundy Thursday

The day before Good Friday is called Maundy Thursday. The word "Maundy" comes from the Latin word mandatum, which means "commandment." In the gospel of John, Jesus makes this statement during the Last Supper: "I am with you only a little longer. ... I give vou a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:33-35, NRSV).

Maundy Thursday should always be a time of sharing with others, showing loving concern for one another, and partaking of Holy Communion. That is what the Lord asked of his disciples and asks of us.



"Now, John," protested the pastor, "how can you say that? I only see you at Easter and Christmas."



"People love to hear their name," Lloyd says. "Calling a person by name eases their tension a little bit." And the blessing is an added bonus.


Like everyone, Lloyd admits he has his "down days," but he tries to leave them at home, because "These people deserve my cheerful heart."

So he responded. Now a third-year





How to be a "rhino" steward


