Serving & Satisfaction

Finding a story that emanated from the Chicago Tribune on 4-17-07 of a study that money can't buy happiness, I was intrigued. Reading further this article by Barbara Rose states that "clergy are the most satisfied with their jobs; lawyers, doctors down on the list."

The National Opinion Research Center at the University of Chicago ranks clergy at the top of both job satisfaction and general happiness. [I knew that!] Physical therapists and firefighters were second and third. So there you have it.

Most of us know that we enjoy and seem to have the gift of helping people and that in itself gives great satisfaction when done in goodly amounts.

The business world held my attention for twenty-seven years beforehand. I was able to make decisions, handle advertising, personnel needs, training, and scheduling. The pressure was always on for details and knowing how the systems of all the mechanics of our business worked.

This fact alone concerns some of the people on the Trustee committee because the pastor has a curious side that wants to know how things work and how I can help keep maintaining those systems when no one else is around. Some view my gender as the inability to deal with those items and others can trust me to do my best when I am able. I am open to learning and being taught preventive maintenance for whatever is around me as well as the office I uphold. All in all the teamwork of the church and it's own abilities to help each other learn and serve these things make life interesting.

I did not need to have an article in the

newspaper tell me what I know is a priority of my own satisfaction. Being proud to serve even in the face of long hours, at a moderate pay level does not change the satisfaction level. The sense of pride we feel at the status of being in the "clergy profession," is another source of satisfaction.

To share time with those who are bringing new life into the world, other life changing decisions as well as being with folks at a time of illness or death are very rewarding to clergy and especially this pastor.

I have been in a form of "ministry" for thirty-three years when I look at the time that has gone by. I served others in a service-based business that mirrors what my duties and calling from God entails from me currently. The spiritual nature of ministry is a solid reinforcement of a Godly purpose here on earth.

This pastor is pleased to have affirmation that my calling continues to be one that I have already been in touch with for most of my adult life.

Each of us is in ministry right where we work and attend school, or share a home with others. We have been "called" to serve others, to do so in Christ's name and reap the blessings that come when we can "give ourselves away" for others. Some people have a servant's heart and do so at the drop of a hat. Others can see the needs of others and not have it bother them at all to help others. Most people see the need and will respond when they have the time and it does not call them too far out of their comfort zone.

This natural calling to go and serve

others is just what our example in Jesus Christ left us to do for our discipleship. My last session for confirmation class ended on Wednesday. One thing hits home and that is the fact we are here to make a different world, not just make a difference.

The Jewish scholar and rabbi Dr. Abraham Joshua Heschel (1907-1972) once said that God was either everywhere or nowhere. He meant that God was either in our world — our lives, our homes, schools, businesses, theaters, government, etc. — or God was nowhere. In short, the teacher believed that we must live in the presence of God in the most complete way or suffer the consequences of ignoring God, which would be a tragic world.

According to Dr. Heschel, "Only in His presence shall we learn that the glory of humankind is not in its will to power but in its power of compassion. We will reflect either the image of God's presence or that of a beast. There can be no neutrality."

- 5. Bake at 350 degrees for 8-10 minutes or until tops are firm.



A fresh look at Holy Communion

A minister was having lunch with a retired college professor when the professor said that he looked upon Communion as a form of cannibalism. The pastor was so astounded that he decided to examine the meaning of the sacrament again.

His reexamination of the meaning of the Lord's Supper yielded these thoughts:

1. Communion is extremely important because Jesus asked his followers to follow the practice often – in remembrance of him. (See Luke 22:19) Was that a request we should ignore?

2. Communion is significant because it reminds us of the price Christ paid for our salvation – his death on the cross. "This is my body, which is given for you" (Luke 22:19, NRSV).

3. It is also a symbol of the new covenant which God has made with us in Christ. Upon taking the cup of wine, our Lord said, "This is my blood of the new covenant" (Matthew 26:28, NRSV). He is our Lord. Communion helps us remember that we are his people, servants of the covenant-maker.

4. The sacrament is a vivid reminder that we are grateful that we are tied to Christ and look forward to his ultimate triumph on Earth. We partake of Communion joyfully, thanking God for the gift of Christ and anticipating his final victory when he shall be known worldwide as "King of kings and Lord of lords" (Revelation 19:16, NRSV).
