

All the children need: hats, mittens, and scarves, but we shall send separately to make distribution easier. These are additional.




World Communion Sunday

"Development cannot be done for people. It has to be done with then and by them."

Crusade Scholar Jean-Michel Basquin, studying at South Dakota State University (SDSU), Brookings, is eager to return home to Haiti. Equipped with a doctorate in rural sociology, his goal is "to help the Methodist Church of Haiti to shape a better future for the country.

"Lack of rural development," he explained, "often results in overpopulated cities, higher crime rates and other social problems. A healthy society depends on the balance between rural and urban development as most natural resources, including land for food production, are in the rural areas."



Reflecting on the Crusade Scholarship that enabled him to do graduate studies with little financial burden, he said, "I can't be thankful enough. That scholarship is exactly what the church needs to fulfill its global mission. It empowers people so they can empower others."

The former campus ministry director at SDSU added, "I grew up in the church. I believe in the role the church plays in improving people's lives." In helping people to achieve their potential, he noted, "Scholarships are more than important. My scholarship has sustained me substantially.

I could not do without it."

The Comforter is here

Jim put aside his reading material, and off they went. As they made their way on the sidewalk, their feet crunched dried leaves, making loud noises. Becky then said something her father has never forgotten. Feeling con-

fident and brave with her father as her companion, she said, "Daddy, it's not scary to hear noises in the darkness when someone is with you."

When you're afraid, remember that the Comforter, God's Holy Spirit, is as near as a prayer. That's what the psalmist affirmed when he wrote, "Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me" (Psalm 23:4, KJV).



There are many ways you can give to others.
All you have to do is lend a hand!

- 6. When you've completed each act of service, take the hand off, but keep it to use another time.
- Do this activity over and over again by "giving a hand" to someone.

Groton DISCUSSION & SURVEY ON THE

ISSUE OF HUMAN SEXUALITY & CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

As our denomination faces a controversy in General Conference, our church and our members should give prayerful consideration to the issues which will be faced by our delegates and decide where our local congregation stands on the issues. One of the issues which will be considered is one that has split other denominations and already has several of the area churches strongly defending one side of the issue or the other side. Membership for homosexuals becomes a difficult subject to fully discuss because the issue is so emotionally charged. Where does Groton stand? Where do you stand? It may not be as simple as you first think.

To really consider the issue we must know where we are now. The current Social Principles in United Methodist Discipline (the rules which we agree to live by as United Methodists) in no way condemns or denigrates men or women who have a homosexual orientation. It calls for the church to defend the civil and constitutional rights of the homosexuals and to stop rejecting, condemning, discriminating against, coercing, or allowing violence or attacks against homosexuals. As a church, we would allow someone for example, who recognizes that he/she is a homosexual to be ordained, provided they agree to remain celibate. The Bible does *not* condemn the homosexual for being homosexual, and our stance as United Methodists within our <u>Discipline</u> clearly reflects this. The practice, or the acting on the homosexual orientation or desire, is viewed as a sin by Scripture. It clearly focuses on the practice of homosexuality. This is a critical distinction both within the <u>Discipline</u> and within Scripture. Again, this is a critical distinction when it come to discussing this issue, whether the focus on the discussion is around the ordination of homosexuals or the sanctioning of homosexual "marriages" or "civil unions." Our <u>Discipline</u> is consistent with this stance.

In June of 2007 Dakotas Annual Conference passed a resolution, if adopted by General Conference in 2008, would forbid churches or pastors from refusing membership to anyone based on gender identity or sexual preference. This would include practicing homosexuals (individuals actively involved with one or more same sex partners.) It would also include bisexual and transgender individuals. Similar resolutions are expected from other Annual Conferences across the country.

This resolution is a direct response to a Virginia pastor's refusal in 2005 to allow a self-avowed, practicing homosexual to join his church. The pastor did so based on our <u>United Methodist Disciple's</u> stance that as United Methodists' we view the practice of homosexuality to be incompatible with Christian teaching. The pastor was suspended by his Bishop and placed on Involuntary Leave. The case went to the United Methodist Judicial Council (our "Supreme Court") The Judicial Council upheld the pastor's right to refuse the person membership. So now there is a significant effort being made to amend our <u>Discipline</u> to make it illegal for pastors or churches to refuse membership because of one's gender identity or sexual preference.

The resolution passed is as follows:

The Dakotas Conference Youth Petition to General Conference 2008

We, as representatives of the youth in the United Methodist Church of all sexual orientations believe in promoting equality for all people seeking membership in our denomination.

Whereas, the United Methodist slogan of Open Hearts, Open Minds, Open Doors does not advertise any exceptions when it comes to membership in the church. There is no fine print;

Whereas, Jesus did not give any qualifications for being a part of his body - only that we follow and believe:

Whereas, a main reason for discrimination is the fear of change, something we cannot be

afraid of;

Whereas, the church must give the same consideration to all passages of Scripture: no passage deserves more or less scrutiny than any other;

Whereas we, as a people, must not only interpret what God says in the Scriptures, but also what God says to us today;

Whereas, the church exists to be a messenger of God's love. When the church denies that love to anyone by not allowing membership, they are effectively communicating that God is also denying them love.

Therefore, we propose an addition to the Book of Discipline stating that no person shall be withheld membership to the United Methodist Church on the basis of sexual orientation of gender identity.

This resolution is already causing a great deal of unrest in several Dakotas United Methodist churches. If this or another resolution promoting the rights of practicing homosexuals within the church is passed at General Conference, it could tip that balance and ultimately split our denomination. We need to look at both sides of the issue.

For the past 30 years our denomination has sought to balance the need to show love, care, and respect to homosexual persons and to support their civil rights within our society, with the need to honor the biblical call to holiness for those who call themselves disciples of Jesus Christ. Our church has long recognized that this call is for all areas of our lives (including the sexual) to be put under the lordship of Jesus Christ.

The "Open Hearts, Open Minds, Open Doors" slogan of our denomination has been interpreted by some to mean that there is, or should be, no distinction between welcoming people who come through our church doors and those seeking membership to the church. Church membership is based on our renunciation of all sin, our total reliance on the grace of God in Jesus Christ to forgive those sins, and our total reliance on the power of God to help us resist those sins. The first question we are asked when joining th church is: "Do you renounce the spiritual forces of wickedness, reject the evil powers of this world, and repent of your sin?" Membership effectively says, "I have now chosen to leave the world behind me and follow Jesus Christ." If anyone had an "Open Door" policy it was Jesus, but he demands that people who follow him live with principles and standards. For 2000 years Christian moral standards have been based on the Scriptures. Can we now declare that "it's a matter of opinion;" or "it's not what I believe"?

The church should not be just another social club. The church can be holy as well as non-judgmental, loving as well as morally pure, gentle as well as strong, and open to all while uncompromising on its values. The resolution would render it impossible for pastors and churches to discern the readiness for membership of those whose sexual practices are by the <u>Discipline</u>'s standards, "incompatible with Christian teaching."

But are the standards for what it means to be a Christian and what church membership requires different? Do social standards or political correctness or social tolerance change standards or merely open our interpretations? Our purpose as a church is to help people grow up in Christ, not leave them as spiritual infants. Can we determine which sin is more troublesome? Should we view a practicing homosexual as a greater sinner that a thief, or a glutton, or an adulterer? Do we know what other sins candidates for membership have in their lives? Do we check to see if someone is abusing a spouse or child or having an affair? We should not be judging others. Only God has that right.

After hearing these arguments on both sides and after you have taken time to consider the issue, how would you have our delegates vote on this resolution? Fill in the Survey on the bottom of the next page and return to the church office by Oct 24th.
