## Pastor Rob's Ponderings

I just completed watching the John Adams HBO Series. As a history buff, I was fascinated by the portrayal of this oftmisunderstood president. Although a brilliant political theoretician, Adams has been viewed as mean-spirited, divisive and even inept in dealing with others.

This series, based on exhaustive Adams biography by David McCullough, shows a man who certainly has many flaws but is fiercely loyal to his friends and who was a man of complete integrity. I especially enjoyed the portrayal of the relationship between John and his wife Abigail as well as the on-again, off-again, on-again friendship between John and Thomas Jefferson. Even Adams admits without Abigail or Jefferson, his life would have been much worse and the rest of us (posterity, as Adams calls us) would not have done as well.

Do you have friends and family like Abigail and Jefferson? I know some of us might have famous friends and family. (One of my greatest shortcomings is

"name-dropping." I love to try to build myself up by telling people about all the famous people I've met.) But this is not what I am getting at with this question. Do you have people who hold you accountable for the things you say and do? Do you have people in your life who will praise you when you do well and correct you when you do not do so well? Do you even have a person who is willing to "put you in your place" without fear of retribution?

Adams called Abigail his "ballast" because she kept him on a steady course through. He called Jefferson his friend "through the darkest hours." We have that in Jesus Christ as our Rock and our Friend. We also need those people in our lives that can speak the truth of Jesus Christ in the times when it is easy to hear and even in the times when

we don't want to hear it. Do you have a relationship like that? Do you want to know how to have a "Happy Afterlife?" You don't want to miss our services on August 10, 17, and 24th to get the answer to that question!

#### Summer Storms 2008

Dakotas United Methodist Disaster Response is working to help recover from the effects of the tornado that caused damage to homes in Rolla and Belcourt, N.D., on July 7. At least eight homes were destroyed and 21 others sustained significant damages in Belcourt, which is on the Turtle Mountain Reservation in north central North Dakota. Rolla has received approximately the same amount of damage, and damage reports continue to come in. Many of these homes have little or no insurance coverage. These rural communities have drawn together, but need our support.

Immediate needs are PRAYERS and FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTIONS to assist those affected.

Checks, with Summer Storms Fund #646 in the memo, should be made out to your local church, and sent to the Dakotas

Conference office, PO Box 460, Mitchell, SD 57301. Contributions will be used to support recovery efforts.

# Helping the brokenhearted

A retired pastor counseled younger peers to remember that in every pew sits someone dealing with a broken heart. Hasn't that been us at some point? What have we learned from our brokenness? What helps? What doesn't?

People who are hurting don't need platitudes and quick answers. In fact, it's often best not to say anything at all. The most important thing is to just be there. Sit. Listen. Hold a hand. Respond with brief expressions of understanding. When appropriate, offer assurance that God knows of the situation and cares.

After Jesus healed the paralytic,

the man stood up and returned home glorifying God (Luke 5:17-26). Likewise, Christ says to the brokenhearted today, "Stand up and go into your future, glorifying God with good works for his kingdom."




