Coming into the "club" is a new process for this new grandma. I didn't know there was a club, as it was one of those quiet secrets of the rites of passage. My

complete joy was being able to be around the edges of our new grandsons birth process. And the glow is still there, that of being an observer of new life. I wonder about life, nature, and the little things of this world all the time. It is my joy to be in wonderment.

The ability to hold new life in your arms, to listen to their breathing and little sounds in their world as they adjustment is really amazing. To watch tiny fingers, eyelashes, and know that just a short time ago he was curled up in his mothers womb. This world must surely be a shock to a new life.

While visiting in the real world of folks and their inquiries about this birth, I learn some of their stories. And it has caused me to think long and hard about our God.

Each birth story is different, none two alike, just like our fingerprints. Each story whether it is about being born at home on the kitchen table, warmed on the edge of the oven door, kept in a dresser drawer for each new life speaks loudly. I am enthralled over and over again as to the uniqueness of each individuals story. Some are just able to to be born ahead of a storm, some in long hours of labor, some needed help to arrive, and others came in the surgical suite of a hospital.

There are millions of us in our country and billions of us in the whole world all the stories are different, unique unto each of us, we have OUR story.

All that confirms to me that God's hand is, and always has been, upon all of us with great plan and intention. I am able to breath deeply knowing that God has control of all of this around us and we are part of that plan.

We not only trust God to do the very best in God's plan to bring us into this world. Can we not trust God completely to continue to take care of us on our journey?

This process of "grandmatazation" has taught me to experience God in a fullness I have never fully entertained until now.

Each of us has a purpose and God sent God's own son for the very purpose of loving us, dying for us, and redeeming us to himself when we seek Jesus as our Lord and Savior. God is love and beyond what we can experience here on earth. How much more of the Father's love can we share between us. In giving others forgiveness, in healed relationships, kind words, tender acts of kindness, and loving God everyday of our lives.

do we call the first day of Holy Week Palm Sunday?


Palm branches are mentioned in only one of the four Gospels (see John 12:12-15). So why

The legend of the dogwood


