Eternal Light

My United Methodist health care plan has a new wellness incentive which involves walking a certain number of steps per day. As a pastor I have discovered over the course of the winter the church sanctuary makes a great walking track on the cold and snowy days; I have also discovered the church sound system makes a great stereo system to make the walking not so mundane.

The other day, during one of our late South Dakota blizzards, I was walking around the sanctuary listening to music and caught myself looking at the eternal flame that hangs on the wall in the front of the sanctuary. The first church I served in North Dakota had an eternal flame. They're the type that plugs into the wall so the only time the "eternal" flame would ever go out would be if the church lost electrical power. I know it might seem insignificant but when you walk around the sanctuary for a couple of hours, I just started thinking about that flame.

Perhaps I was thinking about it because the previous church I served did not have one and I was rebuffed by some church attenders there from getting one. Perhaps I was thinking

about it because I remember the Crystal (ND) United Methodist Church and its "eternal flame" and all the elderly people who have died in the years since I left there. Perhaps I was thinking about the flame because next week is Holy Week with its emphasis on the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus and the eternal implications of those events. Perhaps I was just thinking about it because there is not that much to think about when you are walking the aisles of a church sanctuary for two hours.

Why was I thinking about that eternal flame at the front of the sanctuary? All the reasons listed above are good answers. Of course, the most spiritual one, the most "pastoral" one would be about Holy Week, but the fact of the matter is all of those thoughts were going through my head. That is what "eternal flames" are meant to do - get us thinking about the past, present and future whether we are facing Holy Week or not. My prayer for you is for God to bless you with the time to think and ponder your past, present and future with Him.

Will be held April 29th with time to be announced. Friendship Night at the Church with the play "How's Your Heart" Salad luncheon will be served. Cost is \$6.00.




Free Children's Carnival

Native American Ministries Sunday - April 26

We cannot tell you her name, but we can tell you her story.


The abuse began when she was a child. No one hugged or encouraged her. She was punished brutally for not measuring up. She left home as soon as she could and met a man she hoped would give her the unconditional love she never received from her parents. But after the wedding, he husband beat, insulted and threatened her. She wanted to leave, but she was expecting a baby. Where would she go? What would she do? The abuse ended when she divorced him, but resurfaced again in another bad marriage. Eventually she found refuge in a domestic violence shelter and entered the New Beginnings Program at the Navajo United Methodist Center in Farmington, N.M. After 18 counseling and education, she is no longer a victim. She is a survivor. "In a few months I will be on my own, but another needy, hurting woman will take my place."

Whether it's providing shelter for victims of domestic violence, filling food pantries, starting new churches or educating Native American seminary students, the special offering is one way United Methodists honor Native Americans.

On Native American Ministries Sunday, United Methodist's cultivate and support urban missions with Native Americans and fund scholarships for Native American seminarians. Your annual conference retains 50 percent of the offering i to strengthen and develop Native American ministries. However, if no Native American ministries exist in the conference, the entire offering is remitted to the General Council on Finance and Administration for Native American ministries in other areas.

The remaining 50 percent of the offering expands mission work with the Native American Urban Initiative and provides scholarships for Native Americans attending United Methodist and other approved schools of theology.

Is it easier to learn Native American traditions from a Native American or an Irish American? This is why the Native American Ministries Sunday offering is critical – to continue the traditions and nurture the gifts of Native Americans.


VBS June 1-4th 5:30-8:30


