### The Future is Today

An article appeared this past week in "ESPN-The Magazine" which theorized there is no way to accurately compare baseball statistics of players from the start of baseball in the late 1800's to today. Among the reasons given were the playing conditions, types of equipment, racial attitudes, and the general condition of ball players. Times were different and we simply cannot compare what happened yesterday with today.

This past week I sat in three baseball stadiums - Frontier Field in Rochester, New York; Doubleday Field in Cooperstown, New York and Busch Stadium in St. Louis. All three were remarkably similar in the size of the playing field, distances between bases and height of the pitcher's mound. All three were also similar in how close spectators could sit to the field. However, there were some remarkable differences. Frontier Field is home to a AAA baseball team composed of players not quite ready for the "big time." In between innings the team hosted "fun activities" for the fans to keep them interested in the game. There was a baseball game but it lacked the "perfection" of the major leagues. I sat in the old wooden stands of Doubleday Field where legend has it Abner Doubleday invented baseball. There was no game that day but sitting alone in the stands was like listening to ghosts of baseball legends. "Perfection" came in watching the grounds keeper prepare for a future game by raking the area around home plate. Sitting in my seat in Busch Stadium was like sitting in an oven watching my favorite team lose to the St. Louis Cardinals. The sun beat down; humidity was high; neither team played well. The only "perfection" I could think about was, "How perfect this would be if it were a night game."


The new slogan being used by many United Methodists is "Re-Think Church." 

### What is Annual Conference?

This is a question asked by many in the church, but it is Important to each and every one of us.

This last June we met at Conference in Rapid City, which was unusual, as the rotation of meeting places usually takes place in central and eastern part of the Dakotas Conference - North and South Dakota.

Annual Conference committees meet to review their work, plan work and budgets for the coming year to bring to the attention of the 600 or so members of the Annual Conference.

Each Charge, or group of churches, is allowed to send their clergy and an equal number of lay members to the Conference. These are all voting members in addition to Committee chairs and members at large.

This past year, in the light of the economic climate, the budget was raised a small percentage. However, during the conference, it was brought to our attention the camps suffered flood damage this last Spring and Summer. The allowance of \$100,000.00 was added to our apportionments that we pay yearly to help proceed in repairing the camps. This would apply mainly to the Wesley Acres Camp in North Dakota. Wesley Acres provides boating experiences as they are on the river and had recently re-located some buildings as a result of the dam there which was done by the Corps of Engineers.

The Board of Pensions has been encouraging wellness for clergy and their famiy, thus our administrator and secretary were busy during Conference preparing for the time to continue with this. It was not unusual to see band aids on arms during the sessions, and it was heartening to see that this is going to be a serious project. For their efforts, the premiums for clergy health payments should be reduced, Lay members are encouraged to: develop leaders, create places for new people, eliminate poverty and improve health globally.

The Romans 12 Task Force report was adopted - it is good reading and carried out by the ads you have seen about Rethinking Church - not only go to church, but take church to others. That is the mission of this Dakotas Annual Conference.

Proposal is in the works to change the method of apportionments for the local churches - this will be an objective for the coming year.


More mission teams are active in our Conference: solar ovens are increasing in use, the kits asked for in our churches are in great demand not only in this country, but around the world. A new addition to our depot at Sager Brown in Louisiana is being attempted at a three acre plot in Salt Lake City to accommodate the western part of our country. The facilities there are not as compact as Sager Brown, but churches do offer sleeping and eating facilities for those teams wishing to work there. Not only kits are assembled, but communities profit by work teams that repair and operate services for children and needy families.

Lay Speaking, United Methodist Men, United Methodist Women, Women in Ministry and Dakotas United Methodist Historical Society hosted special gatherings at meal times.

Memorial Service and Ordination of new clergy were special moments to mark another year of progress.

Watch for announcements for special events, kits that are needed, and opportunities to rethink your church objectives.



cussions at the Dakotas Conference. She told the council that there had been much flood damage at Lake Poinsett and at Wesley Acres camping areas. Repair will cost approximately \$100,000 and has been included in this year's budget.

It was reported that apportionments would increase approximately 5% and that there is a new proposed apportionment calculation. Therefore, it is important that we work to clean up our membership list. Those members who continue to stay on our rolls, but don't live here could be moved from the "active roll" to the "constituency roll". 
