Failure

A reporter recently asked me about the feelings I had leaving the Metrodome after watching my beloved Minnesota Twins lose. When asked I stared back as if to say, "What do think I'm feeling you big dope?" It hurts to lose. It hurts not to do as well as you thought. It hurts to fail a test. It hurts to make an embarrassing mistake. It hurts to have an experiment fail. You get the picture.

An experiment being tried in the Groton Church recently failed, although I must admit not totally to my surprise. For the past few weeks I've been putting certificates for free Dairy Queen Blizzards under the pews, in the hymnals and behind pew bibles in the hope it would lure people toward the front of the church. What I soon realized was people were not moving forward; instead, they were sending the kids hunting for the certificates following the church service. What a colossal, expensive failure that experiment was!

No one should really be surprised at the result – most of all me. One of my classes in college actually did a mapping survey over the course of two months as to where people sat in church. It was amazing to see the results of families and sub-groups of people sitting in the same areas of the sanctuary Sunday after Sunday.

There were a couple of explanations that seemed self-explanatory. Some people sat in the same pews because their families had purchased those pews in memory of their loved ones. Does anyone remember the "pew tax" which is how many churches in the 1700's and 1800's raised money?

Other people sat in the same places because it was easy to "escape" the sanctuary with a noisy child even though their children now had children. Of course, others sat in places out of habit. The youth sitting in the balcony; the elderly sitting toward the front on the aisle.

Sitting in certain places can also be an experiment in how "welcoming" we are in church. In one of my first churches, I was about to enter the sanctuary for a funeral service when I heard a familiar voice coming from the other side of the wall say, "You're in my seat. I always sit there. Please move!" And I always thought the person saying it was a very warm, welcoming, hospitable person. The parishioner certainly failed to show those attributes in that situation. It also reminds me we never know who is watching and listening to us.

This past Sunday we talked about serving others. I tried to "serve" the church Dairy Queen blizzards but this is not the kind of service Jesus is looking for. Sure, I was happy to give to the kids. It was actually fun to watch them scramble after those certificates. But the kind of service Jesus is wanting, and the kind of service which is even better to watch, is the type which is truly welcoming and hospitable. See you in church!




LIFE ON THE STREETS, OB-SERVES LAURA PRESSLEY, IS PARTICULARY HARD ON WOMEN.

"Women dealing with addiction don't have the safety net and support many men have." she says. "They're uneducated. They're poor. They are usually single mothers. And they are addicts." The faces and stories of the women she met while volunteering on a first-aid squad have stayed with her as she pursues a master's degree in counseling and addiction ministry at Methodist Theological School in Ohio. She hopes to create an inne r-city residential treatment program for women of color. "Being able to merge my passion for psychology

and women's studies with my interest in addiction really clicked," she adds. "I know it's God's will for my life because I've never felt so much at peace with myself."

WITHOUT SCHOLARSHIP HELP FROM FUNDS RAISED ON WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY, SHE WOULDN'T HAVE BEEN ABLE TO SIGN UP FOR CLASSES THIS YEAR.

"I'm up to my ears in school debt," Laura says. "It's only because of United Methodists who have given on World Communion Sunday that I am free to pursue the rest of my education without fear or anxiety."







Autumn is the perfect time of the year to sow kindness and reap a "harvest" full of friendships. Make this special treat to share with someone.

What you need:

- An adult to help
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter or margarine
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 cup cooked or canned pumpkin
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- $2\frac{1}{2}$ cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- ¹/₂ teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups diced, roasted almonds
- 1 cup chocolate pieces
- Raffia or fall-colored ribbon (optional)

What you do:

- 1. Cream butter and sugar together until light and fluffy.
- 2. Beat in egg, pumpkin and vanilla.
- 3. In separate bowl, mix flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, nutmeg and cinnamon.
- 4. Add dry mix to creamed mixture.
- 5. Add almonds and chocolate pieces; mix thoroughly.
- 6. Drop by teaspoons onto wellgreased cookie sheets.
- 7. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes or until lightly browned.
- 8. Cool on racks. Makes about six dozen.
- 9. Stack two cookies on top of each other. Then tie them like a present with the raffia or ribbon. Give the cookies to friends and family to thank them for their friendship.
