


Health Kits Collections by Feb 26th

- 1 toothbrush (single brushes only in original wrapper, No child-size brushes)

100th anniversary of the Boy Scout movement

Lord Robert Baden-Powell (1857-1941) was a lieutenant-general in the British Army who loved hiking and camping in the wilderness. He wrote a small handbook for soldiers called Aids to Scouting. It became so popular among teachers and youth leaders that he rewrote it with young people in mind. Scouting for Boys was immediately a best seller and led to the establishment of many Boy Scout groups in England.

Soon afterward, scouting groups began popping up across America.
Churches were so supportive of the movement's values that many churches sponsored Scout troops — and still do.

The official beginning of Scouting in America was February 8, 1910. Each year, many churches recognize their Scouts on the Sunday before February 8.

The leaders of Boy Scouts of America have designated September 1, 2009, through December 31, 2010 as "A Year of Celebration." The year's highlight will be Jamboree 2010 (July 26-August 4, 2010), which promises to be the largest celebration of Scouting in America. More than 43,000 scouts and leaders are expected to attend the event at Fort A.P. Hill, a 76,000-acre camp outside Washington, D.C.



Haiti Solar Oven Partners Still at Work in Haiti

Montas Joseph Family: Montas and his wife Raymonde are the Haitian Project Directors. They and their family are okay. At the time of the quake, Montas was working with a United Methodist Volunteers In Mission team in a city about 40 miles west of his home. The city of Petit Goave was also hit hard by the earthquake and Montas was involved in the rescue effort of mission team members and his long-time friend and fellow interpreter, Jean Claude. A section of the Joseph house was destroyed and the questionable structural integrity of what's left means that the Joseph family, like thousands of others, are homeless. Water and food are in short supply. The Haitian people share whatever they have even when it appears that there is nothing to share.

Jeanne Milcar: She is our project's solar oven assembly person. We heard from her through phone contact within 24 hours of the quake. She is okay, but as is with most everyone in the quake area, she is thirsty, hungry and living on the streets.

Jean Claude Degazon: He is a language interpreter working with the Methodist Guesthouse and has served our mission teams as an interpreter and as a volunteer for special projects. He survived, and in his own words written in a Saturday email: "God rescued me and Montas pulled me out from the debris. I am ok and [my] family as well." He, his wife and two children are living with few resources.

Omilus Saint Louis: He was the director of the Methodist Church of Haiti Publishing House and enthusiastic supporter of the Haiti Solar Oven Project. Omilus is also an architect and helped our organization with building projects, clearing a sea container from Customs and anything else. According to reports, Omilus died when he was hit by a piece of concrete while helping his wife get out of their house. He had a special gift of working graciously and effectively with everyone and will be sorely missed.

Bernard: Has worked with recent solar oven mission teams as an all-around helper and interpreter. Bernard along with his sister, brother and mother all survived, but they lost their home and suffer with extreme shortages and homelessness.

Jean Michel Basquin: A former Methodist Church of Haiti development director who worked with Solar Oven Partners in the past and also did his graduate studies at South Dakota State University is doing well. Jean Michel lives in the city of Les Cayes, west of the areas affected by the earthquake, and was out of harm's way.

With a response beginning to emerge, specifics of our ministry plan must first address getting our Haitian team back on its feet, followed by earnest pursuit of the purpose of Solar Oven Partners. Our mission addresses the underlying causes of hunger, poverty and environmental destruction and that must not only continue, but grow. 
