In this CNN article, the author quotes Kenda Creasy Dean the author of the book "Almost Christian." Apparently youth in our country have been subjected to a "Mutant Christianity" in which God becomes a "divine therapist" whose main purpose is to coddle believers and boost self esteem. In "Almost Christian" she suggests that this self-serving understanding of Christianity is being taught to younger believers by parents and pastors who have no idea what they are modeling for youth.


Is she right? Do we model this understanding of faith to our children? And if so is this a contributing factor to the exodus of youth and young adults from our parishes? For Dean, She concludes that this is indeed a contributing factor and that churches are not giving teens "enough to be passionate about."

We need to bring the passion of our faith back to the church. 
Only today

We still need volunteers for Sunday School.


Thank you to everyone who donated items or helped with VBS. VBS was very successful with an average of 32 children every day.

Cub Scout/Boy Scout Parent Meetings are held on the 3rd Weds of each month beginning at 7 pm.



The beginnings of Sunday school

Englishman Robert Raikes, born in 1735, was a Christian layman who was pained to see unschooled children working six days a week in factories or mines. On Sundays, children roamed the streets, often getting into trouble. Most didn't know how to read or write and knew nothing about Christ or the church.

As Raikes labored to reform England's prison system, he noticed that many children were imprisoned, stirring him to action on their behalf. He arranged for halls and homes to be used for educational purposes on Sundays, the one day children didn't have to work. He found volunteers to teach reading, writing and math, as well as the Bible and Christian beliefs.

The first Sunday school class was held in July 1780. Amazingly, by 1788 some 250,000 children were attending such schools. This occurred despite some people's opposition to the education of lower-class children.

Countless boys and girls have attended Sunday school classes since then, thanks to Raikes, who brought Christ's light and love to children around the world.
