Hello Church Family,



Groton UMC Upcoming Projects

As most of you know, the church was burglarized this week and several things of value were stolen from the office. The Administrative Board held an emergency meeting to discuss the safety and security of our building. Decisions were made to add cameras in several locations and limit access to one entrance. Repairs to a door are needed and new locks will need to purchased. The estimated cost of this project, including cameras and items needing to be fixed or replaced, will be approximately \$2,500. If you would like to donate to this project, please designate any funds to the Security Project. *********

A second project that was approved by the board, at an earlier date, is to add an AED (automatic external defibrillator) to our church. This is equipment that is easily used by lay people and can be critical in saving a life of someone who has suffered a heart related incident. General emergency supplies available in the church, including band aids, wound dressings, glucometer, and blood pressure cuff, will be added. The cost to purchase the defibrillator is approximately \$1900 and includes all of the needed supplies and a metal box for visible storage. There are

available discounts made available to churches that we are applying for. We are working with the Groton Rescue Squad to assure the equipment is similar to other AED's that are located at other public sites in Groton, such as the schools and other churches. If you would like to donate to this project, please designate any funds to the Emergency Equipment Fund.

Special Groton UMC Board Meeting - April

The Groton UMC Official Board met for a special meeting on Saturday April 1, 2023. Twelve members were present. Topic of church vandalism to be discussed.

President AM Mitchell called the meeting to order. Pastor Brandon Dunham offered a prayer. Pastor Brandon gave an overview of the vandalism from the beginning of the incident to the present time. A Bible Study of 4-5 people had just left the church. A list of damages and articles stolen were reviewed and discussed.

Lon Gellhaus made a motion to have Pastor Brandon buy a new iPad, Kindle and air Pods and the church and the Pastor Parish will reimburse him. Seconded by Roger Rix. All members voting Aye.

Suggests for new safety measures: Carna Pray: Lock chapel, sanctuary, and offices and install 1 camera at the north door.

Kay Daly: Wireless Systems are not a good option with the church having cement walls. Presented a 4 camera and 8 camera system with NVR that would be effective for our church. Cost of camera system is \$1275.99. She can install it with assist of some men helping to drill holes in cement walls and running the wires. Further discussion was held on lock-



ing of the church now and after cameras are installed.

Meri Erickson made a motion that the church purchase the 4 and 8 camera system. To keep the office locked at all times. All exterior door will be kept locked an a keyless keypad will be installed on the north door. Seconded by Val Baker. All members voted Aye. Motion carried.

Pastor Branon will give a short overview of the incident and plans to update the safety measures in church on Sunday.



WE ARE YET ALIVE: UNITED METHODISTS IN THE HISTORY OF NORTH DAKOTA AND SOUTH DAKOTA

We are yet alive: United Methodists in the history of North Dakota and South Dakota

I have posted <u>Chapter Five</u> of the new history of <u>The United Methodist</u> <u>Church's Dakotas Conference</u> on my website. Both the content and my writing of it have been a long time in the making. Chapter Five goes back to the Second World War and generations that have today just about finished leaving us. It comes forward to the merger of denominations that, in 1968, created The United Methodist Church—a denomination that is today rapidly splitting apart over human sexuality.

I turned my attention to the period 1940-1968 in 2020 just as the COVID pandemic broke out. Today, as I post the results of thinking about these war and postwar years, many United Methodist congregations are trying to put themselves back together after a long and difficult struggle just to stay open.

It was not easy for me to present the people who lived thru the 40's, 50's, and 60's in their own terms—highlighting their hopes for a better, more peaceful world and their ignorance of how the real world would turn out in the 21st century. I found myself constantly making connections between their time and our time, something that historians need to do but not at the expense of understanding the people who lived before

Anyone who reads Chapter Five is bound to look for what's "relevant" today and will quickly find it in my descriptions of war, race, gender, counseling as a practice of ministry, involvement of Christians with social issues, congregations as social service providers, emphasis on the spiritual development of individuals, camping and the call to ministry, starting new congregations, fundraising, and the real reasons for membership decline.

Many Dakotas United Methodists will recall people whose lives I discuss like Byron and Gladys Davis, Rod Gist, Bishop Garrison, Bishop Heininger, Fred and Mabel Hubbard, Grace Huck, Harvey Sander, Roger Smith, Bob Vessey, Bishop Voight, and Bob Wagner.

We need a good deal of imagination to remember that people familiar to us because they figured large in the recent past actually came from a different time than our own. But we also need imagination to discern a more profound connec-

tion with them.

They lived, like we live, as stewards of the world they inherited, not the world they might have preferred to live in. Like them, we live in fear, hope, and ignorance about the future. Helping to create a better world, as they did in many ways, requires humility about our limits but also courage not to give up.





Death doesn't win

In the final hours of 2021, a wild-fire near Boulder, Colorado, destroyed 1,000 homes, including one belonging to Pastor Bill Stephens. His family, out of town at the time, lost all their possessions. After months of feeling buried in debris, insurance paperwork and mourning, Stephens decided that Easter 2022 would mark a fresh start.

During worship that morning, the pastor shared a photo of vibrant daffodils emerging on his charred property. Burned remnants were visible in the background, just as Easter's backdrop includes the pain and death of Good Friday. But the empty tomb in Easter's foreground means death won't win, reminded Stephens. Even when earthly life "isn't all daffodils," we have hope and eternal life through

Jesus.

Easter reveals that God will "give us the joy, and it's going to be in the heart of pain that we go through as well," added the pastor. "And that just makes me draw closer to God."

Groton Ad Council - March

Groton UMC Ad Council met on March 15, 2023 at 7 pm in the fellowship hall with the following persons present: Sherwin Nyberg, Carna Pray, Marjorie Overacker, Linda Thurston, Anita Lowary, Allen Walter, Lon Gellhaus, Kim Weber, Val Baker, Pastor Brandon Dunham and AM Mitchell presiding. Pastor Brandon led the group in an opening prayer.

The meeting agenda was approved on a motion by Linda
Thurston and seconded by Marge
Overacker. All members present
voted aye. The minutes from the
previous meeting was approved on
a motion by Carna pray and seconded by Linda Thurston. All members
present voted aye. No correspondence was presented.

Treasurer Marge Overacker reported that conference apportionments had been changed from 15% to 14% for this year. Groton is currently paying 25% of the assessed amount. No change was made.

The finance committee reviewed current giving and the high heating bills. Trustee President Tyke

Nyberg reported that the church furnace needed a new circuit board on the newer pump.

Pastor parish Committee report was given by Carna Pray. The parsonage inspection is set for May. The sump pumps in the parsonage will be tested before snow melt.

Pastor Brandon presented the administrative report: Lenten Stud-

ies were going well. Maundy Thursday services will be in Groton (none in Conde) on April 6 at 6:30 pm.
Groton Community Good Friday
Service will be held April 7 at UMC at 7 pm. Easter Sunday services will be at 7 am and breakfast will follow at 8 am.

In old business the request for use of the church for a day care and preschool center was reviewed.

Insurance costs would expect to rise by about \$2000.00. Several minor construction projects would have to be completed. Concerns on sharing the space and the need for childcare services in Groton were discussed.

Moved by Val Baker and seconded by Marge Overacker to have Pastor Brandon tell them that for this time the answer would be no. All members present voted aye.

Carna Pray reported on the progress of setting up a first aide kit with AED. Supplies purchased so far were \$70.33. Advantages of buying the same brand as used by Groton Rescue Squad was mentioned.

Grants are still being investigated.

Kim Weber reported that an effort was being made to organize a group for Christian fellowship for all elementary (grades 1-5) stdents. It would include teaching Acts of Kindness. She requested we host an April 16 organizational meeting. Moved by Tyke Nyberg and seconded by Val Baker to allow this April 16 meeting to be held at our church. All members voted aye.

Kim Weber reported that she



had been approached by Al Nordstrom and Rick Weiland to have a meeting on the Life Defense Fund Amendment on April 16 at our church. After discussion it was decided to not host this meeting because the issue could be too controversial.

Kim Weber asked about a meeting about the division of Global Methodist from United Methodist. No meeting was required unless more members wanted to follow through with discussion or separation from the United Methodist.

Val Baker reported that the Mission Committee and Sunday School were having a silent auction on baked goods on April 2 to provide Easter Baskets for the Sunday School Children. Meeting adjourned on a motion by Marge Overacker and seconded by Tyke Nyberg.
