Have I ever told you I enjoy Christmas music? I enjoy Christmas music! I like it so much you could catch me in June listening to "Joy to the World" as I'm watching a baseball game. I enjoy Christmas music so much I bought a speaker so I could listen to my Christmas music on my noisy school bus route in the mornings.

I've built a playlist of all sorts of Christmas music. If I hear something in a movie, on a TV show, in a store, or recommended on radio, I'll add it to my playlist. Over the years, I've added "standards" like Bing Crosby's White Christmas and Frank Sinatra's "Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas." I was introduced to Mannheim Steamroller's Christmas albums by a good friend. And I added music I've heard walking in Walt Disney World in December (Why do you think I keep taking a week in December to do something with Disney? I love the music!). I will never forget the reaction from my Mom who asked me who was singing, "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen," one day and I told her it was the group, Barenaked Ladies. Haha!

Consider the classic, "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" (sung in my playlist by that great Christian group, Straight No Chaser). I wonder how many people know it is a "Methodist

Hymn" when they sing this Christmas carol written by Charles Wesley, the cofounder of the Methodist Movement?? Like all his hymns, Wesley writes what he believes using the songs to teach Christian beliefs to the people singing them.

In the first verse, Wesley quickly uses the phrase, "God and sinners reconciled" to explain the purpose of the newborn King. In the second verse, the words, "Christ, the everlasting Lord" and "Veiled in flesh the God-head see" tell us who Jesus is. And in the third verse, Wesley describes Easter by writing, "Risen with healing in his wings." Who would ever guess there's so much in this carol?

So you might get tired

of Christmas music starting in October; you might even shake your heads at those of us listening to the stuff in August. I would like to offer some advice, "Think about the words you're hearing. Ponder them." Yes, there is something silly to listening to "Jingle Bells" or "Dashing through the Snow" in July. So try out "Hark! The Herald Angels" or even "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day" Think about the message.

I might just convert you into a "Summer Christmas music listener!"

Decorating the church for Christmas

Many churches invite their members to help prepare the church for Advent and Christmas. Some call the event the "Hanging of the Greens." Pine or fir branches, holly, pine cones, candles, colorful cloths or ribbons and an Advent wreath are used for decorations. A tree with Chrismons hanging on it is often placed somewhere in the sanctuary. Some churches add a new decoration to the sanctuary each week dur-

ing the season.

The custom of displaying a Nativity scene in the chancel dates from the early 1600s. The tradition started in Germany.

It is thought that the first live Nativity scene — in which live animals and people representing shepherds and wise men gathered at an outdoor manger — began with St. Francis of Assisi around the year 1220.





A season of relationship

For his Christmas album *Milk & Cookies*, worship leader David Crowder wanted to focus on the relationship aspect of the holidays and the mixed emotions involved. Deaths of loved ones, absence from home or having "no home to get back to," he says, can wrap sadness into what's supposed to be a joyful season.

Yet pain and separation perfectly mirror the meaning of Christmas, according to Crowder. "It's about the created being at a distance from their Maker and ... God making a way back into communion with [them]." He adds, "I feel like most of the stuff that we experience around the season points to what is the miraculous — that there was the best gift ever given, and it was to make a way back into relationship with our Creator."
