Ephesians 5:20 - always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

This morning I give thanks to God for slough grass. For those "not from around here," Northeast South Dakota has many scattered low areas called sloughs where rain, snow, and run-off water collects. Having lived in the South where these areas might be called swamps, these low laying wetlands are impossible to cultivate and farm. In fact, sloughs in this day are off limits to farming because of the habitat they provide and the water they collect.

Sloughs have always been ugly to me. Instead of a beautiful small lake, sloughs produce this tall, thick ugly brown grass which can be seen all year, even in our snowy winters. Sloughs are where mosquitos and other pests breed. I know they help collect needed water and help our surrounding cropland in years of drought, but they just seem ugly.

No more! As I write this column, we survived an early Spring blizzard which forced us to cancel Palm Sunday Services (that's called a "late season blizzard"). We also had our first snow day of the school year (That's how mild our winter has been). This morning school started two hours late and as I climbed into my school bus for the



morning route I wondered what the roads would be like. This is where the slough grass comes in.

Slough grass might be thick, brown and ugly to some but it is also very sturdy, so sturdy that it stands two to three feet without bending over in stiff winter winds. As I drove north from Groton this morning the highway was covered with a sheet of ice (snow melt which had hardened in the blizzard winds). But as I kept driving up toward an area surrounded by sloughs, the roads became as clear of ice and snow as if it was a summer day. For a few seconds I wondered what had happened until I recognized there was no snow along the road or even at the tops of the slough grass. What I realized was in the areas which had allowed the snow to simply blow across the road, snow melt created thick sheets of ice. The slough grass simply

stopped the snow at its outer edges preventing it from getting to the road. I'm starting to love slough grass.

Another side benefit of slough grass I noticed this morning was the protection it was providing for waterfowl which had migrated north thinking the winter was over. In fact, in one slough I saw what might have been over a hundred ducks nestled in the grass.

Do you now the story of Corrie Ten Boom? Her family hid many Dutch Jews during the Second World War helping them to escape the Holocaust. Near the end of the war, Corrie's family were arrested by the Nazi's and sent to concentration camps. Corrie and her sister, Betsie, eventually ended up in the same camp. While in the camp, Corrie wondered if she would ever survive. Her sister told her to "give thanks for everything" which Corrie

found hard to do. One day Corrie, Betsie and their bunkmates were forced to move into a flea -infested barracks which even their guards refused to enter. At first Corrie was miserable and thought they would all die of some disease but Betsie realized something about this situation. With their guards thinking the barracks was fleainfested and unwilling to enter, the ladies could hold bible study, pray out loud and support each other as Christian sisters in ways they would never had been allowed to do previously. Corrie said she finally realized the value of giving thanks for everything.

Slough grass is a long way from suffering in a concentration camp, but it was valuable on a nerve-racking icy road. What are you thankful for? See you in church!



What you need:

- Large bowl

June Groton Ad Council

The meeting was called to order by Chairman, AM Mitchell. Those in attendance were, AM Mitchell, Carna Atherton-Pray, Anita Lowary, Jolene Townsend and Jeanne Wanous. Carna Atherton-Pray shared a prayer prior to the discussion of business.

The <u>agenda</u> was approved on a motion by Jolene Townsend.

The <u>previous meeting minutes</u> were approved on a motion by Anita Lowary.

Correspondence:

- Jeanne Wanous shared a Thank You note from Tristan Kampa.
- Copies of the Dakota/Minnesota Methodist Foundation Connections newsletter were shared.

Committee Reports

<u>Membership—Anita Lowary</u>: Anita stated that those GUMC members currently listed as members who have not responded to two previous letters from our membership committee, will receive one final letter asking if they want to continue to be listed on our membership list. If they do not respond, our membership committee will remove them from our list. Carna Atherton-Pray motioned to approve that those members who don't respond to this final communication be removed from our membership list. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

<u>Memorial—Linda Thurston</u>: Linda was not present, but Carna Atherton-Pray who is serving on the kitchen remodel committee shared that they have begun to make remodel plans followed by getting estimates. All work would be paid for with designated memorial funds. However, if current piping under the floor becomes an issue, that would not be covered by memorial funds. The council confirmed that the project would need to meet with approval by the council before any physical work could begin.

<u>Missions--Val Baker:</u> Val was not present but communicated via email that the recent Taco Feed served 25-30 people and collected \$111 for missions. The committee also plans to start collecting personal hygiene items for the High School students clothing closet beginning July 7 to get a jump start on the Fall school Year. <u>The Caring Team-- Jolene Townsend</u>: The Caring Team gifted our 2024 graduates with tshirts related to what their plans for the fall were. This team will also be helping with the upcoming Gary Ruckdaschel celebration of life at our church on June 21.

<u>Trustees</u>: Tyke Nyberg sent word that plans are for Heartland Heating to fix the leaks on the boiler sometime this summer.

Treasurer's Report:

<u>Church Treasurer</u>-Jeanne Wanous: Jeanne reviewed the treasurer's report and noted that monthly offerings are not keeping up with monthly expenses.

<u>Financial Secretary</u>-Allen Walter: no report <u>Pastor Parish</u>-Meri Erickson: Meri was not present but Carna Atherton-Pray said that PPR completed and sent in our annual church assessment with our basic concerns being small attendance causing financial concerns.

Bills to be Presented:

<u>R-Technics Bill for \$190.00 from Kay Daly.</u> This bill is for the renewal of the presentation software contract. Pastor Rob and Kay feel a need for this program. Anita Lowary motioned to approve this contract renewal as a PPR expense. The motion was 2nd and passed.

Administrative Report:

<u>Pastor Rob</u>: No report as Pastor Rob is on vacation.

Old Business:

IRS Certified Letter Update—Anita Lowary. Anita met twice in Aberdeen with the IRS to make sure that our original non-profit status is restored. They now agree and understand that the Groton UMC should be considered a non-profit institution and are making the necessary changes. This change may take up to two weeks. Lon Gellhaus has also proven to the state of SD that we are non-profit.

New Business:

Annual Conference Expenses—Carna Atherton-Pray: Carna has chosen to donate her Annual Conference expenses. It was agreed that she will submit a reimbursement request but will donate it back to the Groton UMC once she receives her reimbursement. <u>Substitute Pastor—Carna Atherton-Pray</u>: Carna asked for permission to invite Gary Compton to be a substitute pastor for us when needed in the near future as we are short of available substitutes. The council agreed that Carna has the authority as the PPR chair to invite Gary to be a substitute.

<u>Fresh Expressions Ministry—Carna Atherton-Pray</u>: Carna explained her proposed activity as an open invitation to young people approximately Jr. High through 12th grade. A suggested format of Fresh Expressions Ministry used in the UMC is to share a Jesus story and then teach kids something new like playing cards or some other social skill. She expects this would be done in the evening with a meal. Carna would like to start by this fall. There were no objections by the council.

Easier Method for Changing Hanging Orb— Jeanne Wanous: The hanging Orb above the organ needs to be changed periodically and requires asking someone to bring in a very tall ladder to complete the task. Carna volunteered to ask Allen Walter if he has any ideas to make this task easier to complete by any monthly committee member.

Discuss Status of Manger Figures—Jeanne Wanous: Jeanne explained that the nativity figures were purchased in 1985 as a memorial gift to the church by the Wegner family. These figures are now 40 years old and haven't been displayed during the Christmas season recently. Jeanne was curious if the council would be in favor of continuing to use them. After discussion, the council agreed they would like to continue to put up the nativity display at Christmas time. The council stated that we need to determine if the manger is still usable and if there are any electricity issues that need to be addressed.

Other Discussion: It was noted that Nancy Ruckdaschel complimented us on how nice the church looks. Nancy and her husband were married in our church in 1968 and she will be using our church for a Celebration of Life for her husband, Gary on June 21. It was also noted that the hanging alter flame needs cleaning.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:05 pm.




